Preparing to Apply

Getting Started: Admission to the RN program is based on required prerequisite courses and a system of factored points. LPN-RN applicants are advised by nursing faculty. Please e-mail LPN2RNadvising@highline.edu for a referral to an advisor. **Attendance at a Nursing Program Information Session is strongly recommended.** Sessions are held in building 2: 1 - 2 pm and 5:30 - 6:30 pm on July 21 and October 20, 2009; January 26 and April 20, 2010.

Prerequisite courses: Applicants must have completed the following prerequisites at the time of application to the program (end of winter quarter 2010). Applicants must have earned at least 5 quarter credits (or 3 semester credits) and a minimum grade of 2.5 in every course to be eligible to apply. *In 2008, students selected into the nursing program had earned an average of 3.52 on their prerequisite courses.*

Application, Admissions, and Program Timelines

Highline Community College Admissions Application: As soon as possible, students transferring from other colleges must complete a Highline Community College admissions application online at www.highline.edu or visit Admissions/Entry Services in Bldg. 6. Acceptance to HCC does not guarantee acceptance to the ADN program. Applicants transferring coursework from other colleges must pay the college application fee before transcripts will be evaluated. There will be an RN program application fee effective 2010. More information will be available in the application packet.

Nursing Program applications available: Applications are available November 2, 2009 in the Admissions/Entry Services department, Bldg. 6. Instructions for completing the TEAS™ will be included in the application packet.

Program Application due date: February 1, 2010: Your completed application packet must be mailed (postmarked no later than February 1, 2010) or delivered in person to Admissions/Entry Services, Building. 6 - Highline Community College, 2400 South 240th Street * PO Box 98000, MS 6-8, Des Moines, WA 98198-9800

Transfer credits: If transfer classes are to be considered, official transcripts and a *Request to Evaluate Transcripts* form must be turned in to the Admissions/Entry Services staff, Bldg. 6. This includes any other colleges at which prerequisite courses were taken. Transcripts must arrive by February 1 except for those courses taken in winter 2010. HCC students do not need to print Highline Community College transcripts. The last day to submit official winter 2010 transcripts from the other colleges is April 9, 2010. HCC's Nursing Program does not accept transfer of nursing credits from other nursing programs.

Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS™): All applicants must complete the TEAS™ during the current application process. There is a \$25 fee which is payable online to TEAS before testing can occur. Information about how to take the TEAS™ is on page 5.

Factoring Notification: By the end of April, 2010, applicants will receive a factoring form showing the following: grade points, TEAS™ score, and work experience/degree points earned. You will be notified of your exam score on this form. Applicants are required to return the response form by the deadline provided.

Admission Notification: Admission decisions will be mailed to applicants on May 28, 2010 in the form of one of three letters: 1) Offer of admission for 2010, 2) Offer of a position as an alternate for 2010, or 3) Regrets that admission is not offered. **We do not keep a waitlist from year to year.**

Additional Information

Criminal Background Check: Once accepted into the program, the student will be required to submit a criminal background check by the Washington State Patrol and the Excluded Providers List of the Office of Inspector General. This is required by state and federal law and by clinical agency policy. Some clinical facilities fingerprint students for federal background checks and randomly screen for drug use.

Clinical agencies retain the right to refuse placement to students with a history of certain offenses. Highline faculty and staff can not predict this decision with certainty. Therefore, prospective students are encouraged to investigate how their background check might affect a potential clinical placement. Program Timeline and Schedule: The program starts in the Fall quarter every year. Nursing theory and laboratory classes will be held Monday through Fridays, 8 am to 5 pm. Students may be assigned to clinical practicum on either day or evening shift. **The program is only offered as a full-time program of study.**

Necessary Skills and Abilities for Nursing Students:

- Use of the senses to gather information
 - Detecting color changes in the skin
 - Hearing heart and lung sounds through a stethoscope
 - Palpating pulses and feeling hot/cold skin
- Motor abilities such as
 - Standing and walking
 - Reaching and bending
 - Grasping
 - Lifting and carrying

Use of speech, reading and writing to communicate

Ability to synthesize information from a variety of sources and apply it in making decisions

Emotional stability and flexibility to function effectively in situations of stress

Eligibility to be licensed: Following successful completion of the ADN program, students are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). The license to practice Registered Nursing in the state of Washington is granted by the Washington State Nursing Care Quality Assurance Commission. To be eligible, this commission requires applicants provide information regarding physical and/or mental condition and criminal history. TEAS™ (Test of Essential Academic Skills) Information 2010 Nursing Program Admissions

The TEAS™ is required for admission into the RN program at Highline. Testing appointments are available from January through February. Completed RN applications require all materials be submitted by February 1, 2010 and testing completed by February 26, 2010.

Testing Appointment. The TEAS™ is a computer based test. Testing will take place in the Highline Community College Testing Center by appointment only. You must call (206) 878-3710, ext. 3251 to schedule your testing appointment. Since there are limited testing stations available each day, it is in your best interest to schedule an appointment as soon as possible.

TEAS™ Payment. The cost of the TEAS™ test is \$25.00 and the payment must be made before testing. Go to <http://www.atitesting.com/> to set up a username and password. **Use 545516 for assessment ID. Highline is not listed on the testing site list, you must scroll down the page and click on “Continue” and follow direction to pay with VISA or MasterCard debit or credit cards, write down/remember the product code. The product code will allow you to access the test during your scheduled testing time at Highline.**

TEAS™ Preparation. Applicants can prepare for the TEAS™ by purchasing a workbook and/or by taking the pre-test online. Goto the TEAS™ website to learn more about preparation options <http://www.atitesting.com>.

Retesting. RN applicants can retest only once 30 days after taking the TEAS™ test. If test is retaken, the last test score is the score used.

Scores. Testers will receive their scores immediately after testing. The TEAS™ transcript (scores) will be valid for two years. Test scoring translation: 84.6% = 8 .5 points or 80.53% = 8.1 points

Transferring TEAS™ Scores Applicants who take the TEAS™ at another college will be required to order official test transcripts (scores) from ATI, the producers of TEAS™. ATI will require a pre-payment of \$25.00 for every set of official transcripts (scores) ordered. Your Testing Appointment. On the day of your testing appointment arrive 15 minutes early and bring your photo identification card and the product code you received when paying online. You should plan on spending 3½ hours for the actual testing. February 26 is the last day for testing for 2010.
